The dying role: People want to share memories, pass on wisdoms and keepsakes, settle relationships, establish their legacies, make peace with God, and ensure that those left behind will be okay. They want to end their stories on their own terms. This role is, observers argue, among life's most important, for both the dying and those left behind.

Provides a detailed workbook, key forms, and in-person guidance to help participants with the process in 60 minute seminars.
